I. CALL TO ORDER/REVIEW OF AGENDA

II. APPROVAL OF NORTHWEST LEADERSHIP FORUM MINUTES

Dr. Matthew Domas made a motion that the minutes of the Northwest Leadership Forum meeting dated October 30, 2020 be approved. The motion was seconded by Dr. Tonyalle Rush and carried unanimously.

III. AGENDA ITEMS – Dr. Michael Heindl, President

Dr. Heindl began by reminding everyone of the Vision, Mission, and Values of the college.

Vision

NWCC is a learning-centered community providing educational opportunities with quality instruction for students from all walks of life. Our college fosters a culture of innovation, collaboration, and student success. We strive for continuous improvement, with a standard of excellence in every area of the institution. Our college partners with businesses and industries that seek to grow the economy and the workforce, as well as partners with alumni, friends, and others. Engagement takes place in all communities that the college serves.

Dr. Heindl encouraged the Leadership Forum to attach a commitment goal to their budget request for FY2022.

IV. AGENDA ITEMS – Dr. Carolyn Wiley, AVP of Academic Instruction and Institutional Effectiveness

A. Achieving the Dream

Dr. Wiley reported on the Achieving the Dream virtual conference that took place on February 16th- 19th. Achieving the Dream Network is an engine for innovation, transformation, and results. Achieving the Dream is a national, nonprofit leader in championing evidence-based institutional improvement.

- Achieving Equity
 - Raising the achievement of all students while narrowing the gap between the highest and lowest performing students and eliminating the racial

predictability and disproportionality of which student groups occupy the highest and lowest achievement categories.

Dr. Wiley had an interactive Kahoot! For the Leadership Forum.

The following information was discussed throughout her presentation:

- More than half of NWCC students are students of color.
- One in three undergraduates is the first in their family to attend college.
- 68% of all undergraduates receive Pell grants, need based grants for low-income undergraduate students.
- Northwest population is 43% male and 53% female

Equity Data that was discussed based on age, race/ethnicity/gender/economic status:

- Success
 - Completion
 - Persistence
 - English
 - 48% of students complete English in the first year.
 - The percentage of students that complete English Comp I within their first year:
 - 53%- Female
 - 43%- Male
 - This is a 10-point equity gap in gender.
 - o Math
 - 15% Black, 30% White, and 32% Hispanic complete Math in the first year.
- Early Momentum
 - \circ 12 credit hours
 - The percentage of students complete 12 credit hours within their first semester.
 - 62% Pell
 - 71% Non-Pell
 - 0 credit hours
 - The percentage of students that do not complete any credits their first semester.
 - 12% (and we are improving)

Dr. Wiley shared that to achieve equity in education we must develop leaders who can transform our institutions by eliminating inequitable practices and cultivate the unique gifts, talents, and interests of each student, so that, failure is no longer predictable by student identity, racial, gender, economic, or any other social factor.

 - Estimated to go live with SFP on October 1 with CX being completed before the end of the calendar year.
 - Finance
 - Payments to vendors are in the testing phase of functionality.
 - Moving forward with activating the Supplier Portal.
 - Vendors can input required tax information & banking information for electronic payments.
 - Ability for vendors to see purchase orders issued.
 - Ability for vendors to see if payment has been made on purchase orders.

 - Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund II
 - NWCC received \$10,861,070 from the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA)
 - \$2,893,508 of the funds is required to be used for student emergency grants.
 - College will directly award emergency grants to students without the application process.
 - Funds will be distributed through BankMobile on March 4, 2021.
